
Activists, academics, scientists, writers. Even a former president of the country. People from India and the diaspora who have influenced people across the globe with the power of their ideas.

Fareed Zakaria, 47
Editor-in-chief of *The Washington Post*, Fareed Zakaria is the Murdoch Chair in Indian-American Studies at the George Washington University. He identifies as a "libertarian" who tries not to be doctrinaire. His book *Washington Rules* has emerged as a must-read for anyone who wants to understand the Muslim mind.

Deepak Nayar, 59
President of the World Bank anti-poverty programmes, she has spent nearly 30 years working for international development agencies and organisations in Asia and Africa.

Amartya Sen, 78
The Nobel laureate is the champion of the underprivileged in an era where market fundamentalism dominates economic debates. His proteges are also powerfully influential. His work is as argumentative as ever.

Salman Rushdie, 64
His works as a writer is as important as his political activism. He is among the world's most famous prisoners. He is at the centre of the "God of Small Things" debate, he may well grow into an outstanding person. The best isn't over.

Jagdish Bhagat, 77
Professor of economics and law at Columbia University, he is a leading advocate of free trade. Now that he is back in India to debate, he recently challenged Amartya Sen's plea to end India's international trade policies.

C.N. Rao, 77
A noted scientist, Rao is the chairman of the committee of scientific advice to the Prime Minister. He is a Linus Pauling research professor. He is as unpredictable as the scientist he is himself.
